

SHOULD FOLLOW EXAMINER.

W. W. Staudt advises the Clergymen to follow
the Approved Method.

Saturday evening, Dec. 18 at 7 o'clock, the
members of the city will meet at Hilliard
Hall for the purpose of forming a general union
religious body for spiritual work in ministerial
