## JUDGE KELLEY'S DAUGHTER MARRIED. From the Philadelphia Press, Nov. 4.

It was announced vesterday that on the 17th of last month Florence, the daughter of the Hon. William D. Kelley, of this city, was married at Zurich, Switzerland, to Lazare Wischnewetzky, a young Russian physician. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Walter H. Bion, and was the outgrowth of an attachment formed more than a year ago. In 1882 Miss Kelley sailed for Europe under the escort of her brother, William D. Kelley, Jr., and when he was obliged to return to this country she was joined by her mother and another brother. During her travels she met Mr. Wischnewetzky, and later became a fellow-student with him in a special course of studies at the University of Zurich. This close companionship and kindred intellectual pursuits soon ripened into affection. and the marriage is the result. Miss Kelley is a young lady of unusual literary talents, her European correspondence to the Washington National Tribune having attracted widespread notice. The groom is the son of a wealthy manufacturer of Taganrok, Russia, and is likewise intellectually brilliant, shining particularly in social science and economics. After the ceremony the young couple removed to Heidelberg. where both continue their studies, the husband at the university and the wife under private tutors.
