Judge Sears was admitted to the Illinois bar in 1878 and practiced for 15 years. He was elected judge of the Superior court in 1893 and four years later was appointed to the appellate bench. In 1900 he was again named to this post, which he resigned three years later while chief justice

Former Judge Sears was the Republican candidate for mayor in 1897 against Carter H. Harrison. He was defeated when the Republican vote was split through the entrance into the race of three independent.
